BUMS Leyburn Trip Report - Gunnerside Gill - Friday 16<sup>th</sup> October 2015 Location: Gunnerside, North Yorkshire

Weather: Overcast but dry after damp start

The Walk: Gunnerside - Gunnerside Gill - Blakethwaite Dams - Rogan's

Distance: 10.8 miles Total Ascent: 2300 ft Time: 6 hrs

One of the (many) highlights of our weekend at Colletts B&B in Leyburn was the walk in Swaledale up to Gunnerside Gill to explore the remains of the lead mining industry, which employed 4000 miners in the region in the 1880's. So, fully fuelled by a "Full Yorkshire" breakfast we took the 30 minute drive over Grinton Moor to the village of Gunnerside where we easily found parking space for our 3 cars. One notable breakfast absentee being Colin, who was feeling queasy and was therefore totally unfuelled but ready to walk.

Even as we parked up, the mizzle turned to steady drizzle and most of the squad opted for full wet weather gear as we headed up the east side of the beck through the woods. After a mile or so, we began to see the spoil heaps, bunkers, and remains of buildings which supported the lead mines. As the rain had ceased, we set up a coffee break amongst some ruins which were set high above the beck and which gave us good views up and down the valley.

The path petered out at Blakenthwaite Dam, and above the dam we had to make a tricky crossing across the remains of a bridge which provided scope for a drenching but sadly for the camera wielding paparazzi (Jim and Lesley), all made it safely over onto the moor.

The toughest part of the day was the next mile across the pathless grouse moor, knee deep in heather to the summit of Rogan's Seat. We finally arrived at the unimpressive summit cairn amidst mutterings from the troops. Later they would look back and say that the heathery flog really enhanced the day out, but that was certainly not the mood at that particular time. Furthermore it was past one o'clock but where could we find a suitable lunch spot on the barren windswept waste of Rogan's Seat? As we descended south on a landrover track, we came across a wooden cabin used by the grouse hunters, which was unlocked and unoccupied, complete with tables and benches, just perfect for weary BUM's to enjoy their lunch. This was unexpected triumph for the leader, who had anticipated our lunch spot hunkering down somewhere in a peat hag. We followed the stony track as far as East Grain, where we turned onto a steep path, descending alongside the beck to some more mineworkings, at which point we crossed the beck and followed the high level path which contoured around Black Hill. This was the most scenic section of the walk, with superb views of Swaledale and the surrounding hills. This path

finally took us to the hamlet of Ivelet and from there across a few fields returning to our car park at Gunnerside.

Before returning to Leyburn, The Kings Head in Gunnerside provided much needed rehydration, with a roaring fire and excellent local ales.

The Walk: Scar House and Dale Edge from Middlesmoor, Distance: 11 miles Total Ascent: 350m Time: 6 hrs

The walk started from Middlesmoor, a fine looking Yorkshire hill-top village in Nidderdale (an AONB) but without Colin and Amanda who weren't so well and they went off for a visit to nearby Masham of Theakston and Black Sheep brewery fame.
