Trip Report: The Lake District

Weather: Warm with a mixture of sunshine and clouds and light winds

A few last minute changes left a small squad of only 6 Bums for this trip, good for our carbon footprint as we could all squeeze into Gerry's Galaxy. A prompt departure at 7am, John was the only one hard enough to wear shorts!; saw an uneventful journey up the M6 to Shap, before the twisty narrow lanes down to Mardale Head at the southern end of Haweswater Reservoir. We thought we would be the only ones about at 9.30 am on a Saturday morning but we passed a load of Landrovers full of country folk and trailers full of Hounds for some sort of Hound racing meet. Low and behold when we reached the small car park at the end of the reservoir there was a gazebo set up for a Fell race with runners coming down from Nan Bield Pass and then, after refreshments, heading up over Gatescarth Pass, so much for a quiet corner of the Lake District!

The weather is fine, sunny and warm as we set off steadily uphill to Nan Bield Pass, where
